The Neighborhood Leadership Academy is a year-long educational initiative hosted by the City of Plano, Texas that provides free support and training to neighborhood groups wanting to grow and create positive impact in their communities. Each year, four or five groups – including homeowner's associations, neighborhood associations, and crime watch groups – apply to participate in the Academy to set goals, outline visions, create mission statements, and plan specific neighborhood building activities. The Academy helps groups identify assets and gaps, create marketing plans, build organizing strategies, and roll out engagement activities. Through

the Academy, participating groups make plans to take action and develop new ways to create connections.

Main Street is an independent nonprofit subsidiary of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. It was founded forty years ago to preserve the historic buildings in neighborhood or downtown business districts, and evolved into a multifaceted network of more than 2000 local members in 46 states and Puerto Rico.

Main Street teaches and provides technical assistance around a four-point approach that local leaders customize and implement to preserve existing businesses and attract new ones, attend to the physical design of the district, promote and manage an overall district image, and maintain a healthy organizational structure to keep it all going.

<u>Kamla Lewis</u> is Director, Neighborhood Revitalization for the City of Shaker Heights, Ohio. You may remember her from our case study on her work in the Moreland neighborhood, as well as her participation in a webinar on strategies for Black middle neighborhoods with Alan Mallach and Johnette Richardson.

<u>Deborah Moore</u> is Director of Neighborhood Strategy and Planning for Neighborhood Housing Services (NHS) of Chicago. She develops NHS' strategy for working with urban neighborhoods in Chicago as well as south suburban municipalities.

<u>Johnette Richardson</u> is Deputy Director of Neighborhood Housing Services (NHS) of Baltimore, and former Executive Director of Belair-Edison Neighborhoods Inc.. She has contributed her creative ideas and leadership to the middle neighborhoods movement from both organizations. She has also been named Vice President of the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners.

New Research on Middle Neighborhoods

Dr. Roland V. Anglin, Dean and Professor at the Levin College, and a team of researchers in Levin's Center for Economic Development (CED), including Molly Schnoke, Project Manager, and Dr. Iryna V. Lendel, Director of the CED, have been awarded a two-year, \$250,000 grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) as a part of RWJF's "Policies for Action: Research on Housing Policies That Promote Equity" program. Levin partner Cleveland Neighborhood Progress is also part of the research team. The project is titled **"Investing in the Middle: A New Approach to Deliver on the Promise of Equitable Neighborhood Development,"** and the team will work to address equity and health in middle neighborhoods.

Middle neighborhoods are opportunity-rich with place-based resources, but risk falling into a distressed state because of lack of investment. Dr. Anglin and his team will perform actionable research in the areas of strategic investments and policy innovations that have the potential to increase housing affordability and neighborhood stability. Their research and learning will inform the work of policymakers, funders, and community development practitioners across America's industrial heartland. CoP member Jason Powers, Director of Middle Neighborhoods for the City of Cleveland, is a partner in the project.
