Building Community Leaders with Training and Fun, Targeted Programs

The Neighborhood Leadership Academy is a year-long educational initiative hosted by the city of Plano, Texas that provides free support and training to neighborhood groups wanting to grow and create positive impact in their communities. Each year, four or five groups – including homeowner's associations¹, neighborhood associations, or crime watch groups – apply to participate in the Academy to set goals, outline visions, create mission statements, and plan specific neighborhood building activities. The Academy helps groups identify assets and gaps, create marketing plans, build organizing strategies, and roll out engagement activities. Through the Academy,

participating groups make plans to take action and develop new ways to create connections.

During its first year, the Academy took place in a live setting and the pre-meeting 'dinner hour' helped build relationships among group members. This was harder to accomplish in 2020 when everything went virtual, but residents still came up with creative ways to connect and were still able to gather ideas, get advice from the city's neighborhood planner, and develop projects to complete in their communities. To participate in the Academy, groups need to have at least four active members and two who are willing to attend all meetings and workshops.

Asset Mapping Tool

One class through the Leadership Academy focuses on asset mapping, an activity that helps residents define and build upon community assets. Once assets are mapped in the neighborhood, the group brainstorms ways to utilize them. This helps community leaders focus on targeted activities to meet community needs, and pair them with existing assets which may be individual residents, businesses, physical spaces,

¹ Homeowners Associations, or HOAs, are very common in western states, incorporated into the development of a subdivision of homes. They play the role of a neighborhood association where they exist, in addition to running the business of collecting HOA monthly fees to maintain common areas such as landscaping, pools and even streets and sidewalks, managing those finances, monitoring rules and regulations instituted to maintain property values, and often working with a paid property manager.

community services, or other institutions. By developing an asset inventory, residents know what is available to start with and what can be built upon. The "Finding and Utilizing Community Assets" workbook includes strategies for marketing, recruitment and record keeping (available upon request).

Plano's BEST Neighborhoods Division

The Neighborhood Leadership Academy is part of Plano's <u>BEST Neighborhoods Division</u>, which identifies neighborhoods that want to be BEST: Beautiful, Engaged, Safe and Thriving. To be successful, neighborhoods need individuals who are willing to be involved, plus a funding stream and leadership strategies. Attention and awareness to neighborhood strengths and needs is important, plus innovative ways to connect and engage with diverse populations. NEW! Pop Up Theater

A pop-up theater is in development that includes everything needed to host an outdoor movie including a screen, DVD player, speakers, cords, and microphones. Interested neighborhood groups can reserve a theater box for pick up. Neighborhood volunteers set up and break down and return the equipment at the end of the event. Groups need to provide their own movie and pay the licensing fee to show the movie. On the night of the event, the entire neighborhood is invited to bring a lawn chair and snacks!
